HISTORY

Clean Memphis was founded in 2008 to foster a cleaner and greener Memphis. We work to inspire Memphians to be environmental stewards grounded in civic responsibility. In 2020, we pivoted our strategy, using research from peer cities to begin focusing on advancing a zero-waste, circular economy policy plan in Memphis and Shelby County.

We engage leadership with data to drive policy changes that support sustainability in Memphis, empower community leaders with tools to beautify their neighborhoods, implement environmental education programs in schools to inspire the next generation of environmental stewards, and collaborate with businesses and organizations to reduce food waste and create a more sustainable local food system.

As I reflect on the past year, I am deeply proud of the strides Clean Memphis has made in building a more sustainable and resilient community. In 2024, we expanded our reach across Memphis and Shelby County — providing environmental science education through 12,000+ student interactions, strengthening partnerships with local and national organizations, and driving measurable progress in waste reduction and food recovery.

Our team's efforts culminated in milestones like the successful completion of the EPA Trash Free Waters initiative and the rapid growth of our food rescue network, supported by the Hilton Global Foundation. 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OUR IMPACT Organizational Highlights

EDUCATION & ENVIRONMENTAL LITERACY

Federal Grant Milestone

- Completed our first federal grant project, the EPA Trash Free Waters initiative.
- As a result, Compass school students collectively **avoided the use of 102,361 plastic water bottles** in a single year by switching to reusable options.

Strategic Partnerships

- Two new national partnerships deepened our sustainability work in schools.
- We conducted cafeteria food waste audits and introduced "Share Tables" through the World Wildlife Fund, reducing food waste and recovering surplus food
- Through National Geographic, we engaged 25 middle and high school students in the Slingshot Challenge, sparking youth-driven solutions to local environmental issues.

FOOD WASTE REDUCTION & RESCUE

Network Size

• Expanded food rescue network to **85 partners** — including FedExForum, Renasant Convention Center, and Mempho Presents — **redirecting surplus food and fighting hunger** in Memphis.

Expanded Capacity

- Thanks to the growth of our Careit food rescue network, bolstered by support from the Hilton Global Foundation we welcomed a Food Rescue Support Specialist in 2024.
- This strategic hire has allowed our Food Rescue coordinator to focus on donor-recruitment and relationship building, resulting in **new partners** and a **dramatic surge in food rescued**.

R COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

River Roots Festival

• Brought together **over 300 community members** and **12 partner organizations** for an engaging event that spotlighted water refill stations in public parks and raised awareness about the environmental impact of single-use plastics.

Volunteer Power at FedEx St. Jude Championship – PGA Tour

• Mobilized a dedicated volunteer team of **31 individuals** who contributed **76 hours** to sort and divert recyclable materials, keeping valuable resources out of the landfill.

PROGRAMS: ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION Empowering Students & Educators



We believe that education is the foundation for building life-long stewardship and civic engagement. Our programs are supported by Stanford University research which found that environmental education develops academic skills such as critical thinking, decision-making, and systems thinking, fostering the growth of lifelong learners and effective problem solvers.

We provide high quality, hands-on experiences that bring environmental concepts to life with a particular focus on how our local community is impacted. Standards-aligned lessons complement classroom instruction, offering in-depth exploration of the content. Our education program brings environmental science to life while empowering students as citizen scientists. Through activities like campus litter analysis and cafeteria food waste audits, Clean Memphis demonstrates how students can be proactive agents of positive change.

IMPACT NUMBERS



PROGRAMS: PROJECT **GREEN FORK Building a Sustainable Food System**



Project Green Fork (PGF) develops a sustainable food system for all Memphians by reducing food waste, connecting local partners, and promoting green dining practices. Up to 40% of food in the U.S. goes uneaten, and the Natural Resources Defense Council estimates that 5,000 tons of rescue-appropriate food is available in Memphis annually – much of it going to local landfills and contributing to climate pollution.

To address this challenge, PGF connects local food providers with surplus meals to organizations that serve people experiencing food insecurity. The program also supports 50 local restaurants in adopting environmentally sustainable practices. PGF strengthens local sustainability efforts by linking service providers like Compost Fairy and Get Green Recycleworks with hospitality providers and food donors such as FedExForum and Renasant Convention Center, connecting them with compatible food rescue agencies.

PROGRAMS: COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Engaging and Empowering Communities

Fostering a robust community engagement program remains a key priority for Clean Memphis. We continue to build a strong network of citizens and business leaders to champion sustainability and support community initiatives that are focused on reducing waste.

In 2024, we expanded our community education efforts to focus on the three R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. Our workshops featured partners such as Memphis City Beautiful and Memphis Stormwater, and were co-hosted with community groups, government agencies, and businesses including Dixon Gallery and Gardens, Boshi Botanicals, Hilton Hotels, Memphis Libraries, Memphis Housing and Community Development, Memphis and Shelby County Schools, the Shelby County Commission, Glenview Community Association, and community centers like Glenview, Greenlaw, and Bert Ferguson.

CIRCULAR ECONOMY TASK FORCE

Building Momentum for a Sustainable Future

The Circular Economy Task Force was created to lead coordinated efforts in Memphis and Shelby County toward reducing waste and unlocking economic opportunity through circular practices. Initially formed to advocate for funding a regional waste characterization study, the Task Force has since evolved into a hub for cross-sector collaboration and action.

In 2024, we reached several important milestones:

- Expanded membership to over **35 stakeholders** from government, business, and nonprofit sectors.
- Launched the foundation for an **industry directory** to better connect local businesses with recycling, reuse, and material recovery services.
- Brokered a formal partnership between Republic Services and Binghampton Development Corporation to develop a mattress recycling strategy, setting a precedent for innovative, community-based solutions.

Looking ahead, the Task Force will continue to raise awareness of circular economy benefits, job creation, improved air quality, and community resilience — and support real-world implementation. A major focus in the coming year is the **Circular Mid-South Summit**, planned for Fall 2025, which will bring together stakeholders to align goals, share best practices, and accelerate action.

This work lays the foundation for a cleaner, more connected, and economically vibrant future for Memphis and Shelby County.

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
